1. Outline

There are many reasons why social scientists and policy experts alike are increasingly turning to civil society in their search for reform concepts, new ideas and progressive initiatives. In times of globalization and Europeanization, nation-state based democracy has lost power and steering capacity. Civil society might provide avenues for getting closer to the people and for making public policy more efficient. However, civil society not unlike democracy constitutes a multi-facetted term with many notions and different meanings.

The seminar will take a closer look at the various concepts of democracy and civil society. We will discuss how and to what extent the two approaches are interrelated on the European level. There is no doubt that both, democratic theory as well as the civil society approach, stand for the normative turn in political science. Rooted in the tradition of political theory, currently both concepts are widely used for the analysis of empirical developments and trends. Particularly the civil society approach has gained momentum against the background of the ongoing governance debate in particular in the context of EU governance. Civil society organizations are supposed to enhance democratic governance and hence participatory democracy. However, is this indeed the case? The seminar will investigate chances and pitfalls of the civil society discussion in Brussels by going through and discussing carefully selected readings that summarize the ongoing debate.

2. Requirements

- Readings: Students are expected to read the assigned literature before each class meeting. The seminar papers are available at the Copy Shop M+M (Wilmergasse).
- Oral Presentations: For each class meeting, two students will make short (15 minutes) oral presentations summarizing and critically discussing further readings for the week.
- Papers: Students have to write a final paper (*Hausarbeit*) of 15 to 20 pages on a topic of their choice which, however, has to be either related to the current development of democratic theory or alternatively to the ongoing debate on civil society.
